General Lodge Information

CHECK-IN: after 3:00 p.m. **CHECK-OUT:** by 11:00 a.m.

LATE CHECK-OUT: Sorry, no late checkout is available. There is no bathroom or shower after check out. We can store your luggage for you in the office. We can make parking arrangements.

OFFICE HOURS: 8:00 a.m.-12:00 p.m. and 2:00 p.m.- 8:00 p.m. Dial 100.

QUIET HOURS: We ask all guests to respect 10:00 p.m.-7:00 a.m. as quiet hours. Please call Night Clerk right away if other guests are disturbing the peace.

NIGHT CLERK: Available after 8:00 p.m. Dial 100 from your room or office phone. Please do not call after midnight for non-emergencies.

Please CALL the night clerk at any time for noise, rowdy neighbors or any disturbances.

ROOM PHONE: Dial 9 + number. Free local and toll free calls.

INTERNET is free. The WIFI password is on the tent card placed in the room. Connect to Tyrolean Lodge network, and enter password.

HOUSEKEEPING is generally between 9:00 a.m.-12:00 p.m. If you place the

"Do Not Disturb" sign on your doorknob your room will not be cleaned or replenished. Additional coffee and towels are available by contacting the front desk before 7:00 p.m. There is no maid service after 12:00 p.m.

SANITIZING keys, doorknobs, switches and all other high touch points are included in routine housekeeping services.

HEAT: The thermostat is located on wall. 70 degrees is appropriate. Rooms heat slowly. Setting heat to 80 will only make the room too hot later and will not make it heat any faster. Space heaters are available from the office.

AIR CONDITIONING: We do not have air conditioning. Opening the window and the door cycles cooler mountain air into the room fairly quickly, especially at night.

ANIMALS: We dot **NOT** allow PETS, EMOTIONAL SUPPORT ANIMALS or COMFORT ANIMALS. A \$150 daily fee will be charged for any animal that is not a service animal. Under the ADA, a service animal is defined as a dog that has been individually trained to do work or perform tasks for an individual with a disability. The task(s) performed by the dog must be directly related to the person's disability.

COFFEE makers and organic coffee are located above the microwave, inside the upper kitchen cabinets.

ICE can be found in the mini-fridge freezer. Sorry there is no ice machine. Ice can be purchased at Carl's Pharmacy three blocks east on Main St.

DRINK VENDING MACHINE is located outside by the lawn and parking lot.

SKI STORAGE: Please put ski gear in your closet inside your room's front door. Please no waxing or scraping in your room. That can be done in the alley outside.

WAXING: If you are a racing team, please speak to management about

waxing facilities. We do not allow waxing in the rooms.

PARKING is available in our lot in front of the Lodge. It is okay to park on the street overnight after 4 p.m. until 10 a.m. Monday-Friday. There are no restrictions on Saturdays and Sundays. Residential parking permits are available for extended hours for a \$3.00 fee. Aspen is a very pedestrian friendly town and best enjoyed on foot.

RECYCLING: We encourage you to use the recycling bins located by the alley, and the adjacent garbage dumpsters.

NEED SOME RAGS: Please do not use our towels for mud or make-up removal. Rags are available at the front desk.

IMPORTANT LODGE POLICIES


RATES are for 1 or 2 people plus \$15.00 per night for each additional person over 16 years of age. (Maximum 5 people per room)

RESERVATION CHANGES: Guests are responsible for the full length of their reservation regardless of the reason.

SMOKING: All rooms are non-smoking! No smoking of any kind is permitted. This includes, but is not limited to; cigarettes, cigars, marijuana, e-cigs, vaping. A \$200 cleaning fee WILL BE charged when smoking occurs inside the room. Please smoke outside, 15 feet away from the building and hallways. The alley and back entrance are good places to smoke.



BEFORE GETTING STARTED



ALTITUDE: Aspen is at 8000 feet in elevation! The higher you go in elevation, the less oxygen there is to breathe, which means your body has to work harder to get oxygen it needs to function. Symptoms of altitude sickness include headaches, nausea, loss of appetite and difficulty sleeping. Mild fatigue is normal, but if symptoms increase, your only remedy is to go to a lower elevation and you should seek medical help if the symptoms are severe.

- ACCLIMATE. Take it easy on your first day at Aspen/Snowmass and allow your body to adjust to the altitude before you enjoy a night out or a big day on the slopes.
- **DRINK WATER.** And we mean A LOT of water.
- **REST.** Allow your body time to catch up to you and replenish your oxygen levels.
- **GET LOW.** If you do start feeling altitude sickness coming on, return to lower elevation at the base of the mountain, call it a day, drive down to Carbondale.

ALCOHOL: Be aware that alcohol WILL hit you harder while you're at altitude. You should plan to take it easy at après and drink less than you otherwise would at home until you get your bearings. You'll thank yourself later!

In addition, make sure you are staying hydrated and drink plenty of water throughout the day and night. The mountains are a lot drier and you'll find yourself dehydrated much more quickly than at home. With alcohol in the mix, this problem can be compounded even more, so make a conscious effort to sneak water in on all your ski breaks.

SUNSCREEN & SUNGLASSES: Higher elevations put you closer to the sun which means higher risk for sunburn, even in winter. Colorado is lucky to have over 300 days of sunshine a year, so be sure to apply sunscreen before you head out to enjoy our bluebird days.



ASPEN MOUNTAIN How we ski Aspen Mountain on a powder day

"Among Aspen's four mountains, Aspen Mountain or Ajax is the crown jewel."

This mountain is for intermediate and experts and offers the most straightforward, efficient, powder skiing. The Silver Queen is a high speed gondola climbing 3267 vertical feet to the top - right from downtown. Though smaller than Aspen Highlands and Snowmass, Aspen Mountain skis much larger than it's legendary 673 skiable acres. The key is to traverse and work multiple trails into a single run and try to stay out of the gulch as long as possible. You will find plenty of challenging double black diamonds, steep fall line trees, sneaky traverses, open glades and gullies.

The locals choice for the first run of a powder day is "face to six."

This means, ride the gondola to the top, then rip down to Bell Mountain and ski the face of Bell down to chair six. Ride the short double chair, known as F.I.S., up and exit right to ski the mine dumps, steep east facing Aspen Glades dropping into Spar Gulch. I recommend Perry's or Last Dollar.

Take the gondola back to the top, ski east towards Independence Pass and pick one of the steep classics, Walsh's, Hyrup's, or Kristy's. After the long traverse out, go right on past the Gents Ridge Lift and head out gentleman's ridge under the experts only banner. Keep to the right, ski the ridge until you see the sign for Jackpot. A nice fall line shot through the trees or if it's open enter the gate for bingo Glades, a really adventurous steep tree run.

Instead of continuing down little Nell to the gondola, consider traversing left on the cat walk to lift 1A, also known as the Shadow Mountain lift, the greatest double chair in North America. You can usually ski up and get right on the lift and back to the dumps or drop down to Bonnie's for oatmeal pancakes.

• **FREE SKI BUS** • Aspen pick up is one block west, across Main Street in front of the Innsbruck. Runs every 15 minutes during peak hours.

The **DOWNTOWNER** is a **FREE** city ride service. Download the app and request your ride.




ASPEN HIGHLANDS How we ski Highlands on a powder day

"Aspen Highlands is the locals secret mountain for uncrowded slopes, mid mountain groomers, steep long fall line glades of steeplechase or hiking the ridge to Highland bowl for the greatest run of your life."

On big powder days when it can get busy, most locals will go straight up to steeplechase or Highland bowl, leaving the rest of the mountain available for more leisurely exploration. The lower half of the mountain accessible from the Thunderbowl Chair contains some great steeps and phenomenal terrain. In Steeplechase there are lots of little secret shots to be found, don't be afraid to get into the woods and poke around, try to stay out of the gullies which tend to get quite bumped up.

Of course the legendary highland bowl entails hiking and gains 800 vertical feet to the 12,392 foot Summit, and takes around 40 minutes, but the views of the surrounding elk Mountains are breathtaking. The north facing G zones, which range from wide open G8 to the tree covered Northwoods hold the deepest and most Wintry snow. But most people have "peak fever "and walk by a lot of less traveled terrain along the ridge on the way to the peak. The east facing B zones actually get some of the best wind deposited Snow, and can be amazing, it's steep, deep and a straight fall line for thousands of vertical feet. While the double blacks can get chewed up pretty quick by local powder hounds intermediate skier's have their pick of Highlands many groomers, where the sides of the runs can hold powder for hours. There's also nothing quite like skiing the intermediate runs under the cloud nine chair with new snow. Save the Olympic bowl area until the afternoon. Stop at the mid Mountain merry go round restaurant to refuel and at the end of the day make sure to hit the Highlands Alehouse for beer and pizza on a sunny deck at the base.

• **FREE SKI BUS** • Highlands pick up is on Main and First Street, right outside our door. Runs every 15 minutes during peak hours.



BUTTERMILK How we like to ski Buttermilk

"Buttermilk is one mountain with two personalities."

Easy-going uncrowded friendly terrain for beginners, intermediates and families and world renowned for freestyle riders and skiers who hit up the park, half pipe and big air jumps of the X Games.

Buttermilk is amazing because you can get from the bottom to the top in one chair ride. So when an overnight storm dumps fresh powder, hop on the bus right out in front of the lodge. Ride main Buttermilk's Summit Express lift and at the top turn directly to Tiehack for perfect powder cruising through intermediate or advanced runs. Easy to get lots of runs here when other mountains are busy.

After the X Games, Buttermilk opens the 22foot superpipe and the last of the slopestyle jumps to the public. You can ski over (or likely around) the mega jumps that boost athletes 65 feet into the air. Buttermilk's crew also redistributes the big-air jump to skier's left of the superpipe, shaping it into jumps intended for up to 35 feet of air.





SNOWMASS How we ride Snowmass on a powder day

"I never go there. It's somewhere past the roundabout. I'm sure glad we have it because it absorbs a tremendous amount of people."

Kidding aside, Snowmass is consistently ranked at the top as best ski resort. Perfectly pitched intermediate groomers, classic expert runs, and lesser known powder day gems. It takes time to explore Snowmass. It's the 3rd largest resort in North America, with 3,332 acres of terrain, 96 runs and 20 chairlifts and there is something for everyone.

The upper half of the mountain is the best place to be. Sheer Bliss chair will take you up to the Cirque and grant you access to blue, blacks, and extreme terrain. Take the Cirque Pomma up to 12,510 feet and ride down to one of the gates accessing the Cirque. AMF and Gowdy's are great runs, along with the Cirque Headwall when it has enough snow.

The High Alpine chair will take you to the Hanging Valley Wall and Glades. Take a short 5 min hike up to the Hanging Valley Wall and find amazing runs such as Wall 1 and 2, Frog Pond Glades and for a real challenge Upper and Lower Ladders.

On the opposite side of the mountain is the Elk Camp chair which takes you to the Burnt Mountain access. Hike five minutes up to Burnt Mountain and find the longest run at Snowmass, ironically named Longshot. Also on Burnt Mountain are 3 black runs for more challenging glades to ride. The best is Rio with glades, open space and lots of little drops to keep you entertained

• FREE SKI BUS • Snowmass pick up is one block east on Main Street across from Paepcke Park. Runs every 15 minutes during peak hours.

ASPEN MUSICAL FESTIVAL AT THE MUSIC TENT & HARRIS CONCERT HALL: Aspen hosts a summer-long, world-famous classical music festival. To get to the music tent, walk or drive six blocks north on 1st street, which turns into Lake Avenue then continue on Gillespie St. to the parking lot, or take the Crosstown free shuttle leaving from the Yellow Brick School on 1st and Bleeker St. © 960 N. 3rd St., 970-925-3254.

SUMMER SATURDAY FARMERS' MARKET: Located in downtown Aspen from 8:30 a.m.-3:00 p.m., this marketplace runs from the middle of June to the middle of October. Three blocks of hand-crafted food, art and clothing offer much to explore. • West Hopkins Ave.

THE ASPEN TIMES and ASPEN DAILY NEWS are great resources for town happenings. Newspapers can be found out front of the Lodge on Main Street.

EXPLORER BOOK STORE: Browse and relax in Aspen's own unique bookstore. There's a quaint organic bistro upstairs. Just two blocks east on Main Street. \odot 221 East Main St.

Local Attractions

ASHCROFT: Visit a 140 year old ghost town from the silver mining days. Summer hiking, winter cross-country skiing trails and sleigh rides are available. From the roundabout, take the third exit onto Castle Creek Road and continue for 13 miles.

PINE CREEK COOKHOUSE: Located in Ashcroft at the base of the Elk Mountain Range, this unique destination serves up hearty gourmet lunches and dinners. Reservations are required. ⊙ 970-925-1044, pinecreekcookhouse.com

FREE SKIER SHUTTLE: Aspen has four ski mountains. Each ski area has a different pick up spot. Ask the front desk. Buses run every 15 minutes in the morning and afternoon, and every half hour mid-day.



NORDIC SKI TRAILS: In the winter there are 90 kms of free groomed cross country trails for classic or skate skiing. The Aspen Cross Country Center on the Aspen Golf Course has rentals, and is a good place to start. aspennordic.com

INSIDER TIP: The winter ski from Ashcroft to the Pine Creek Cookhouse is a real treat. Castle Creek Road in the fall is a spectacular drive into the heart of the Elk Mountains. Experience several invigorating hikes from Castle Creek Valley.




ASPEN HISTORICAL SOCIETY: Aspen's rich history breeds a sense of local pride. Find out about the mining boom, the making of a world class ski culture and destination, the countercultural spirit, and the town's quirky characters at the Aspen Historical Society. • Located behind the Wheeler/Stallard Museum. • 620 W Bleeker St., 970-925-3721

WHEELER/STALLARD MUSEUM: Decade by Decade: Aspen Revealed, offers a comprehensive view of local history from 1870s through the 1970s with a focus on Aspen's place in the historical landscape of America. Poignant narratives, historical photographs, and artifacts illustrate the stories that shaped our community's distinct identity. Visitors will discover a new understanding how Aspen became, and remained, such a special place known world-wide in so many diverse arenas. If the five minute walk along historic Bleeker Street, behind the Tyrol Apartments, will take you right there. 620 W Bleeker St. aka Aspen Historical Society

HOLDEN/MAROLT MINING & RANCHING MUSEUM: From mining to railways to ranching, the past comes alive at this pastoral museum that sits on the site of the largest industrial complex in the history of Pitkin County, The Holden Lixiviation Works. The Aspen Historical Society extends free museum admission to visitors who either bike or walk to the museum! The Holden/Marolt Museum is directly adjacent to a public bike trail near the entrance to Aspen. \odot The front desk can provide directions to this lovely walk or ride through the neighborhood and over the river to the museum.

ASPEN ART MUSEUM: Admission-free, globally engaged contemporary art museum. Enjoy a 10 minute walk from the lodge to visit this beuatifull structure, see amazing modern art or go straight to the roof top and enjoy lunch at the acclaimed SO Cafe. 637 E Hyman St ONE OF ASPEN'S TOP ATTRACTIONS, MAROON LAKE AND MAROON BELLS WILL TAKE YOUR BREATH AWAY



Maroon Bells

THE MAROON BELLS is an incredibly beautiful place well worth experiencing. Reservations system was implemented in 2020 and are required to visit the Maroon Bells Recreational Area for personal vehicles and shuttles. When buses are not in operation, vehicle reservations are still required to access the Maroon Bells Scenic Area.

During the summer cars are permitted only before 8:00 a.m. and after 5:00 p.m. To go to the Bells between 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. either drive to Aspen Highlands parking lot or catch the Castle/Maroon bus 1 block east of the Lodge on Main Street. The bus from town runs every 20 minutes starting at 8:02 a.m. Take the free Castle/Maroon bus to the Aspen Highlands throughout June and October cars are permitted anytime; however, ask front desk for specific dates.

The road is closed for cars in the winter months, but walking, snowshoeing, and cross country skiing can be excellent alternatives. Snowmobile and horseback tours from T-Lazy Seven Ranch are also great options.

DRIVING DIRECTIONS TO THE BELLS: Take 82 west about one mile to the roundabout, then take the second exit onto Maroon Creek Road. Follow Maroon Creek Road past the T-Lazy Seven Ranch until you reach the parking lot, 9 miles up. There's a \$10.00 fee per car.

INSIDER TIP: Be prepared! Bring a raincoat, sweater, and maybe binoculars for spotting wildlife. Moose are known to frequent Maroon Lake and all along Maroon Creek on the drive to the lake. Red Fox may be spotted along the way as well as mountain goats up on the cliffs.

Local Hiking Trails

Aspen is nestled in the Elk Mountain Range and is surrounded by National Forest, three designated Wilderness Areas and seven peaks over 14,000 feet. Recreation opportunities abound with summer hiking trails, trail running, mountain biking, ski-touring and climbing.

UTE TRAIL: (steep/strenuous) Hike to the rock out cropping for awesome views high above Aspen. It is possible to continue to the top of Aspen Mountain for an extended hike. Bonus: The gondola is free to ride down during summer operating hours.

SUNNY-SIDE TRAIL: (moderate) This southfacing hike is wide open with good views of Aspen and the Elk Mountains. Being south-facing, this trail dries out first in spring.




HUNTER CREEK TRAIL: (easy/moderate) Close to town, this pleasant, wilderness, creek-side walk leads to beautiful Hunter Valley meadows. Great spot for trail running and hiking.

SMUGGLER MOUNTAIN ROAD: Enjoy a quick work out during summer or winter. Hike up to the observation deck for excellent views of town and Aspen Mountain.

INSIDER TIP: Loads of hikes surround Aspen. The front desk can help make a great selection.

Independence Pass Trails

LINKINS LAKE: This short hike starting timberline leads to a glacial cirque with an alpine lake, tundra and magnificent views of the Continental Divide. • Drive 18 miles east of Aspen on the last switchback before the top of Independence Pass. Park at switchback lot.

LOST MAN TRAIL: This moderately long hike has a few steep sections. Pass by three alpine lakes with views of the Continental Divide, nearly making a loop. This local favorite is a classic alpine hike. • Drive 14 miles east of Aspen, highway 82.

THE GROTTOS DAY USE AREA: For picnicking and exploring with cascading falls, sculpted granite, ice caves and short trails, look no further. • Drive 9 miles east of Aspen, highway 82.

INSIDER TIP: Make an effort to drive up Independence
Pass and leave plenty of time to stop and have a short walkabout anywhere that looks interesting.
Devil's Punchbowl offers cliff jumping just before the Grottos.
Take an easy hike to the Grottos to view beautiful, glacial sculpted granite, picturesque cascading falls. Within minutes, you can step down into the ice cave.

Castle Creek Road

AMERICAN LAKE TRAIL is a beautiful 6 mile out & back, switch backing through aspen forests, before leveling somewhat and reaching a spruce forest with meadows, wild-flowers, and an alpine lake. It's a perfect half day hike. • Drive 10 miles up Castle Creek Rd.

CATHEDRAL LAKE TRAIL is a t 6 mile out & back, through aspen forests along cascading Pine Creek. The trail then ascends through spruce forests to an alpine lake and rugged peaks. • Drive 12.2 miles up Castle Creek Road from the roundabout.

ELECTRIC PASS TRAIL is a 9.5 mile out & back, up to 13,600 ft. with spectacular 360 degree views. Follow the Cathedral Lake Trail up to the Electric Pass Trail.



INSIDER TIP: If you fancy going up Electric Pass to 13k feet, the winds can be cold even during the summer, but it's the views that will make your eyes water.

Biking & Walking Trails

RIO GRANDE TRAIL can be found just below Clark's Market. This old rail road grade turned bike path runs along the Roaring Fork River from Aspen all the way to Glenwood Springs. The perfect place for a morning run or bike cruise.

EAST ASPEN TRAIL: This gravel path runs alongside the Roaring Fork River east of town and is one of the few flat trails around. While Highway 82 is on one side, the North Star Nature Preserve is on the other. Enjoy a pleasant walk, run, or bike ride.

JOHN DENVER SANCTUARY: This beautifully designed park runs along the Roaring Fork River. Ponds, streams and trails lead through enchanting boulders with iconic John Denver lyrics. This is a great place to walk and contemplate, and can be found on the east side of Mill Street, opposite Clark's Market. The chrome buffalo sculpture was made by Lou Wille, builder of the Tyrolean Lodge.



INSIDER TIPS: •Bike the Rio Grande all the way to Woody Creek Tavern and reap the rewards of your labors. •The Pedestrian Mall is active and vibrant...the perfect place for a leisurely stroll, and the outdoor patios make for intriguing people watching.

Mountain Biking

SMUGGLER MOUNTAIN ROAD This ride begins with a hard first climb but leads to an awesome gateway of multiple loop trails throughout the Hunter Creek Valley.

SKY MOUNTAIN PARK: This amazing open space proprty lies on the ridge between Brush Creek and Owl Creek, above the airport. Many different routes sprawl on perfectlygraded modern trails. Views of Aspen, Independence Pass, Snowmass and the rugged Elk Mountains abound. Really awesome modern riding on totally world class trails.

SNOWMASS ski area has extensive liftserved downhill and cross country mountain biking trails. Downhill bikes are available for rent.

ROAD BIKING CASTLE CREEK ROAD to Ashcroft and MAROON CREEK ROAD to the Maroon Bells are a pleasure to climb with little auto traffic. Each climb is about 10 miles, one way. There is a reason many professional riders live in Aspen.



INSIDER TIP: Park at the Snowmass Recreation Center. Ride uphill on the East Rim Trail 3 miles. Turn right at 7 Star Trail for 5 miles of perfect downhill rolling. SPEN'S PEDESTRIAN MALL IS A SPECIAL ATTRACTION ANYTIME OF THE YEAR

HIGHLAND BOWL AT ASPEN HIGHLANDS: Hiking the 800 vertical foot boot-pack to the 12,392 foot peak, is a rite of passage. Pyramid Peak and the Maroon Bells dominate the view as prayer flags ripple in the wind. On powder days the 2,500 foot decent into the bowl can be some of the deepest and steepest skiing on the planet.

FIS TRAIL: Aspen Mountain's FIS Trail was named for the FIS World Championships held here in 1950, marking the first time the event was held outside of Europe. The race included downhill and slalom, and – for the first time in history – giant slalom. Since then, ski racing has remained an institution in Aspen. Swedish powerhouse Ingemar Stenmark won his final race here in 1989, and Americans Billy Kidd, Tamara McKinney, Phil Mahre, Bill Johnson, Lindsey Vonn, and Mikaela Shiffrin have all taken home gold on the historic trail.

UPHIL SKIING: Earn your turns has come of age. Now, hiking uphil is simply our favorite way of experiencing our mountain playgrounds by. Be sure to check the rules.

ULLR NIGHTS: The name Ullr gestures toward the Norse God of Snow, and every Friday of the winter season, Aspen-Snowmass creates a winter wonderland at the top of Elk Camp Gondola. Activities such as

ELK MOUNTAIN EXPEDITIONS brings a local touch to rafting expeditions on the Roaring Fork and Arkansas rivers. Personalized river trips and individualized attention make them one of the best in the business.

APRIL IS THE LOCALS' BEST KEPT SECRET...with long days and plentiful sunshine, the warm weather turns winter into spring and makes skiing like a day at the beach! There's nothing like skiing slush bumps and enjoying beers on the deck. April storms can also be the years deepest powder days. Legendary closing parties throughout all mountains celebrate ending an incredible season and kick off the next. April is also a great time to take advantage of back country ski touring in the surrounding Elk Mountains as conditions begin to corn up. Laid back vibe and smaller crowds make April special.

In the winter, designated uphill routes on all four ski areas for skinning or stabilizers will be marked with orange disks with an uphill symbol. Groomed Nordic trails like North Star Nature Preserve are also accessible, or you also can hike up Independence Pass, Maroon Creek Road, the Rio Grande Trail, or housewife hill up Smuggler Mountain Road.

ASPEN MOUNTAIN: All uphillers must be at the top of the mountain by 9:00 a.m., or make the ascent after 5:00 p.m. Uphilling is not allowed between 9:00 a.m. and 4:45 p.m.

SNOWMASS & ASPEN HIGHLANDS: Uphilling at Snowmass and Aspen Highlands is allowed during operational hours 9:00 a.m. and 4:45 p.m. Dogs are prohibited.

BUTTERMILK: Uphilling is allowed all day, seven days a week on Main Buttermilk, Tiehack, and West Buttermilk up designated routes. The best designated route starts at the Tiehack parking lot.

SPRING BACKCOUNTRY SKIING ABOUNDS IN THE ELK MOUNTAINS WHEN CONDITIONS ARE STABLE

Uphill skiing is the new rage, and in the spring, the alpine ski touring in the Elk Mountains around Aspen and Marble Colorado is unsurpassed. The avalanche danger usually stabilizes somewhat in mid-April just about the time the lifts close. The freeze/thaw cycle begins and the snowpack in the surrounding mountains become a paradise where almost everything becomes ski-able if you are willing to get up very early and hike for it.

There are 7 fourteeners and countless 12 and 13 thousand foot peaks to skin up and ski down. Classic nearby ski tours include: Mt. Hayden, Mt. Sopris and Castle Peak. The photos through out the lodge hallways are all in the Elk Mountains. Around Memorial Day, Independence Pass opens and the skiing on the top is awesome. Blue Mountain, Mountain Boy and Fourth of July Bowl are incredible shots with short hikes and long descents to lower switchbacks on the road. Also, check out the classic couloir on 13,989' Grizzly Peak. Also around Memorial Day the road to the Maroon Bells opens providing access to Pyramid Peak, North and South Maroon and countless other real ski mountaineering objectives. Castle Creek Road is open year round for access to a plethora of peaks and backcountry huts. Aspen Expeditions is a great guide service and touring gear shop as well as the Ute Mountaineer.

If you like to skin, come stay with us for the corn harvest. Skiing usually last through mid June in the high mountains.


